Alumni Spotlight – **Jax Robertson '70**

D id you know that a Bay High alum has 4 World Series rings: 2 from Yankees 1977, 1978; Tigers 1984; and Marlins 1997. This alum is also a Hall of Famer in his own right. Yes Jax Robertson, BHS Class of 1970 received his world series rings, not as a player but rather as a scout or team executive in his 43-year career in Major League Baseball. At Bay Jax was a multi-sport athlete, playing guard/tackle in football and catcher in baseball. He also played JV Basketball his sophomore year. He was on the honor and merit rolls. (Although he had to be a good student because his high school sweetheart was Principal Mengert's daughter Cindy, Class '71 and a Bay cheerleader). During Jax's senior year the Bay football team went undefeated and won the Southwestern Conference. The 1970 baseball team was one of Bay's best, winning the Southwestern Conference, Sectionals, Districts and making

Jax received a scholarship to Ohio University which had just been to the College World Series in 1970. In his first year at Ohio U, Jax got to play with Mike Schmidt, a future Hall of Famer and arguably the greatest third basemen ever. He also played with Steve Swisher, a future Chicago Cub MLB All-Star. Jax's Ohio U baseball teams were highly successful winning the MAC title in 1972 and

In 1974, after graduating from Ohio U, Jax signed with the Chicago Cubs and played for their minor league team, the Key West Conchs. After playing for the Conch's Jax gave up on his dream of being a major league player but found a way to keep his passion and talent for baseball alive. Jax went back to Ohio U and received his master's in their nationally recognized sports administration program. As part of completing his master program Jax had an internship with Memphis Blues, Houston Astros affiliate.

After graduating from the program. Jax secured an area scout position in the Midwest with the Yankees, owned by Bay's George Steinbrenner. Steinbrenner knew Jax from Bay and through Coach Lewellyn. It was with the Yankees that Jax's gift for recognizing baseball talent came to fruition, most notably discovering and signing unheralded Don Mattingly, a future first baseman and six-time

After his 4 years with the Yankee, Jax held a variety of baseball positions. 10 years with the Tigers as crosschecker (a type of scout whose main function is to provide a second opinion on the reports filed by primarily-level scouts on players) and Scouting Director, 10 years with the Marlins as the national crosschecker. 19 years with the Pirates as Special Assistant to GM. He was also a baseball coach at Old Dominion in 1981 when he took a break from scouting. While with the Tigers Jax signed future Cleveland Indians - Travis Fryman. a five-time all-star third baseman and Carl Willis a future pitching coach. Jax spent much time on the road. Area scouting was mostly by car, scouting amateurs in high school and college for the draft. Major league coverage was a lot of air travel to cover MLB teams. He did international scouting, too. Baseball was a fun job in many ways but a lot of time away from home and family. Jax traveled so much that when his daughter was young, she asked to go to the airport to see him. She thought he worked at the airport.

In 2010, Jax was inducted into the Professional Baseball Scouts Hall of Fame. The Scouts Hall of Fame spotlights the tremendous dedication and tireless devotion of professional baseball scouts who spend a significant amount of their lives on the road and yet make invaluable contributions to the game of baseball by recognizing talent. Jax was also East Coast Scout of the Year in 2015. Jax retired from major league baseball in 2021 and since retiring has been a volunteer coach for a cause special to him - The Miracle League of the Triangle, a baseball program for children and adults with special needs. If you are wondering, what happened to Jax's high school sweetheart, the principal's daughter, Cindy Mengert, Class '71. Cindy also attended Ohio U starting the year after Jax and like at Bay was a cheerleader for the Bobcats. She graduated in 1975 with a degree in education and taught elementary school for 24 years in various states. Jax and Cindy married and together, they raised 2 children, a son, and a daughter. They now live in Cary, North Carolina outside of Raleigh where Jax enjoys golf, and they go to the beach as much as possible. They are Carolina Hurricanes hockey fans.



H omecoming, to borrow sport caster Jim Nantz' quote ... is "a tradition unlike any other." A very special weekend welcoming back alumni, friends, and family to our wonderful community. Don't forget to visit our new Bay High Alumni Wall by the west gym. WELCOME HOME. Class of 1962

Homecoming meant there was excitement in school all week that led up to the football game Friday night with friends, family and alumni coming back to Bay from near and far away. A school assembly was held Friday afternoon and all the students enjoyed the shortened classes with no tests. On Saturday, all the students going to the Homecoming dance would get dressed up, go out to eat at a fancy, white tablecloth restaurant and then attend the dance held at Bay High School in the cafeteria that had been transformed and decorated with a fun, exciting theme. There was a band that performed on stage and all the couples danced, talked and sat down between sets. At the end of the evening, everyone went home exhausted and slept in Sunday before having to do homework and get ready for school on Monday. Class of 1987

Homecoming has changed for me over the years. But when I was in high school, homecoming was not about a dance or a weekend of events. Homecoming was a Friday morning assembly that we looked forward to since the first day of school in September. For seniors, it was voting for the king and queen, waiting outside the gym doors as the underclassmen filled the bleachers, girls getting mums pinned on their sweaters or jackets, then filing in as a senior class and filling the chairs on the floor of the gym. We were seniors! The homecoming court was announced and when possible, the homecoming queen from the previous year came back and crowned the new queen. We heard from coaches and student leaders, then the assembly became a pep rally to get us ready for the game and dance that night! Potlucks before the game were for all the girls - cheerleaders, Rockettes, majorettes, marching band members, classmates all gathered at someone's house for the potluck - no special potlucks for special groups. We wore our mums to the game – and our homecoming dance was immediately after the game. Everyone went to the dance in the gym and it was packed! We went to the dance in uniforms or whatever we wore to the game. It was special though - Homecoming was the official beginning of our senior year!

Fast forward 50+ years and homecoming means a parade down Wolf Road, a football game, meeting friends and other alumni at the BAF tent at the stadium, and sharing lots of memories of those high school years. It is a time of reflection..... Class of 1966

Homecoming was a crisp fall October day spent preparing for the Friday night game as a Rockette. Getting ready for the pregame meal at someone's house then hurry over to the field for a quick walk through and wait for the lights to shine bright. It meant seeing faces you haven't seen since the summer, laughter filling the stands and discussions of what was happening after the game that night. Homecoming is a reminder of what life was like growing up in our special bubble of the world. Class of 1986

Homecoming was the highlight of our fall season, with Thanksgiving break a close runner up. We started building our floats out of wood and chicken wire (thank you Mr. Howells) and covered them with paper "pomps". For the Homecoming Dance, we beautifully transformed the cafeteria into an unrecognizable venue and danced and laughed the night away! Great memories! Class of 1974

Homecoming was the smell of fall in the air, the heavier dew on the grass, the beauty of the leaves on the trees, the smell of a distant leaf fire and all the added excitement at school that week. It was the amazing pride we had as Bay High Rockets and the competitive spirit led by the football players, the cheerleaders, the band and the PEP club. Blue and white was everywhere. The PEP rally, the band playing the fight song as we lit the bonfire at Cahoon Park. Building the float as a class – to compete with the other classes. Playing and winning that game meant even more to all of us. On Saturday it was the trip to Neil O'Connor to get those flowers, shining up your parents car, picking up your date and parents taking photos of us with the other couples. The dance with a live band – playing all the best songs we all loved. Like so many other things, Homecoming in Bay Village and at Bay High were special. The memories have lasted forever – as has the appreciation for how lucky we have been. Class of 1978

What I remember most was working on a special set of songs that we had planned – since the summer -to play for the Homecoming game. The Rockettes working on special routines to perform with the music. We were pumped to put on the best show of the year – and we did. Class of 1976

All the activities and pride in school the week of Homecoming is my clearest memory. There were special announcements each day, signs hanging in the hallway (Sink The Shoreman!). The class floats all had some sort of Rocket or nautical theme. For some reason, that Bay High fight song just seemed to be a little more powerful that week.... Victory Will Be For Bay (and it normally was in our day)!!! Class of 1968

Practices were more intense Homecoming week – not because the coaches made it so – but because we clearly wanted to win that game in front of our crowd. We all kept pushing each other harder than ever. We could hear and see the band, the cheerleaders and Rockettes practicing just as hard. We were all "in it to win it"! We were all Bay High Rockets and we wanted everyone to know it. This was our week to shine on our home field. The dance on Saturday night was the award, being able to "cut loose" with your date, your teammates and friends. I wouldn't trade any of it for the world. Class of 1989

It rained on Homecoming night in both our Junior and Senior years. Did it bother us – not one bit. In fact, we may have had even more fun. The paper that was used to construct the floats – and the water-based paints, all faded and mixed into one big blob. Our uniforms, shoes and instruments were soaked – but the show still went on – and we were good, even soaking wet. Changing into dry clothes and going to the dance with all our friends created memories of a lifetime. 1960's

From a teachers perspective (and BHS grad) it was wonderful seeing all the excitement and activity throughout Homecoming week. From fund raising activities, events all week long, the PEP rally and the workup to the game – it always refreshed wonderful memories. The school spirit was at high volume and the collective comradery was amazing. A special week for all, that's for sure.

As a BHS grad – and now parent raising our kids in Bay, one big change I really like is how the whole city gets involved in Homecoming activities now. The Light The Night event at the stadium, the parade, the parents working to transform the school into a whole theme adventure. It seems like the whole city visits the school to see all the decorations and setup. Just another special thing about Bay that we love!





Bay High Špring Sports

This year's spring sports athletes and teams had one of the most memorable spring seasons in quite some time.

B oys Lacrosse Sophomore Sean Kraft broke the school record for most saves in a season with 208 saves.

Baseball defeated Elyria Catholic 3-0 to win the OHSAA Division II District Championship. The baseball team advanced to the Regional Semifinals for the first time since 2010. The Baseball team lost to Defiance 4-3 in the Regional Semifinals. Senior Evan Bottone was named First Team All-Ohio. In addition, Bottone broke six school records including most walks in season (34), most stolen bases in a season (34), highest batting average in a career (.440), most doubles in a career (26), most walks in a career (76) and most stolen bases in a career (76). The baseball team was led by Head Coach Ben Boka.

Girls Lacrosse defeated Rocky River 9-8 in overtime to win the OHSAA Division II Regional Championship. The Lady Rockets advanced to the OHSAA State Semifinals for the first time

in program history. The Girls Lacrosse team lost to Hathaway Brown 14-11 in the State Semifinals ending a remarkable season. Junior Riley LaVogue and Junior Ellie Bennett earned First Team All-Ohio honors. Both LaVogue and Bennett earned USA Lacrosse All-American honors. This also was the first time in program history that the Girls Lacrosse team had athletes earn All-American honors. Four girls broke several school records. Senior Bridget Brown broke the school record for most caused turnovers in a career (88), Junior Ella Boehringer broke the school record for most assists in a game (6). Junior Ellie Bennett broke the school record for most saves in a career (325). and Junior Riley LaVogue broke school records for most points in a game (11), most goals in a season (115), most points in a season (145), most goals in a career (210), and most points in a career (273). Girls Lacrosse was coached by Victoria Budzyn.

The Boys Track Team gualified five athletes to the OHSAA Division II State Track & Field Meet. Members of the 4x100m Relay team that placed 12th at the State Meet were Jace Knapp (junior), Liam O'Leary (junior), Javden Perrine (freshman), and Charles Rice (junior). Michael Hanselman placed 12th in the 3200m Run at the State Meet. In addition, both the 4x100m Relay and the 4x200m Relay broke school records. The 4x100m Relay team of Knapp, O'Leary, Perrine, and Rice ran a time of 43.08 seconds and the 4x200m Relay team of Knapp, Jack Krueger (junior), O'Leary, and Rice ran a time of 1:33.51. The Boys Track & Field team was coached by alumnus George Curran. During the Bay High School




